Over the course of the summer, Madrona can look forward to a major renovation of Madrona Beach, and continuing restoration work in Madrona Woods. The Madrona Community Council (MCC) selected those two projects as the major award recipients of the \$50,000 Kraus bequest. The MCC also voted smaller awards in the form of matching funds for Harrison Ridge improvements and to support the expanded use of the Madrona Shelterhouse.

Several folks emailed me ideas for neighborhood improvement projects but did not follow through with the formal proposal processes. If you had an idea—or a new one has come to you—consider applying for funding from the Cleanscapes Award. As you may know, Madrona and the five other neighborhoods in the Cleanscapes






#### Tutta Lou Press: An Intriguing CD Business

Have you met Sarah Rollinger and her 2,000-pound printing press? On sunny days you can see Sarah in her studio across the street from the Garfield Community Center, hand-feeding cotton paper into her vintage press. I recently encountered her as I walked by and heard the whir of the press and saw the bright blue spinningwheel. While I did not want to interrupt, I was fascinated! Sarah welcomed me, noting that more than once drivers have pulled over to watch too. She then showed me the process as she printed invitations for a customer's upcoming Fourth of July BBQ. Tutta Lou Press (TLP), Sarah's printing company uses a press that

was built in 1926 by Chandler and Price. She found it in her uncle's garage and calls it "Chandler." It was missing several parts, but after three months of searching (and a week of cleaning) she had



With all plate designs created by Sarah, TLP prints a line of stationery, plus custom items. She uses cotton paper made from reclaimed fibers so the finished products are very tactile. The heavy plate presses into soft

paper, leaving an impression like a rubber stamp but much denser. The impression is so noticeable that Sarah sometimes "prints" using only the plate and no ink, creating a blind impression.

Sarah mixes all of the ink by hand. "Mixing the ink is one of my favorite parts of the process," she says. "I find it therapeutic to hear the gentle crackle as the rollers grab the ink and distribute it across the plate." To respect the air quality in the neighborhood, TLP uses vegetable oil to clean "Chandler."

The studio is open by appointment only, but Sarah will gladly demonstrate the press for any who sees her working and stop by. TLP is a proud participant in the Central District Art Walk held the second Saturday of each month from 12:00pm-5:00pm.

#### Kraus Legacy Benefits Woods & Beach

As you probably know, the Madrona community was fortunate to receive \$50,000 to improve the parks and recreation of our neighborhood. If you have not read about the lovely couple Mimi and Martin Kraus that left this legacy, visit www.madrona.us and read the April issue of the Madrona News. It is a truly heartwarming story.

We want to thank all who submitted proposals. The Madrona Community Council (MCC) reviewed and voted on eight formal proposals. We allotted \$45,800 to four of the proposals. The largest sums went to the Madrona Woods and Madrona Beach, both of which received the full amount requested.

Driving the MCC's decisions was the language of the bequest in the Kraus's will: that the \$50,000 be used to support "Madrona parks and recreation." So even though all the proposals drew the Council's approval and verbal support, some had to be declined because they were not in keeping with the spirit of the gift.

The Friends of Madrona Woods received \$25,300 toward ongoing work and debt relief for existing loans stemming from their extensive work over the last decade. The Madrona Beach project received \$17,500 to restore the beach to its condition after a 1995 community improvement. The custom sculptured log must include a memorial to honor the Kraus gift. To help with beach clean-up work parties, email Paige Smith at paige.eg.smith@gmail.com. The Beach Restoration team hopes to have the work done soon.

Two other projects received conditional funding. The Children's Gathering Fund & Indoor Toilet at the Madrona Playfield Shelterhouse proposal, which would fund community programs and a bathroom upgrade, received \$2,500 for infrastructure. Those funds are contingent upon the project receiving additional financial support from other sources. To get involved, contact Mazvita Maraire at the Garfield Community Center, 684-4788. The Harrison Ridge Improvement project, for improvement of the greenbelt along 32nd Ave, received \$500 contingent on the project receiving matching funds from another source within one year.

The remaining \$4,200 remains in reserve to be spent at the discretion of the MCC for future parks and recreation projects.



#### Shopping for a Final Resting Place

Did you know that in King County the price for the same cremation service ranges from \$640 to \$3,944? Or that the price for the same type of burial is as low as \$1,225 and as high as \$3,890?

A recent price survey conducted by the People's Memorial Association (PMA), a Seattle-based nonprofit membership organization, shows that the costs of death-related services vary greatly within Washington cities and counties and all across the state. The survey was performed by the PMA Education Fund and covers 226 funeral homes in Washington. The death of a loved one is an emotionally overwhelming time, no matter what the specific circumstances. Grieving family members understandably make decisions about cremation, burial, funeral services and other matters without comparing alternatives. Planning ahead can help families avoid paying more than they want to or can afford, while still ensuring that the wishes and lives of their loved one are honored. The PMA provides numerous resources related to planning for and dealing with death.
