Monthly Neighborhood Update

Cell antennas were the hot issue at the June Madrona Community Council (MCC) meeting, which John Capps skillfully ran in my absence. Cingular is planning an antenna for the Madrona Plaza building at 1421 34th Ave and Voicestream wants to place antennas on the Madrona Presbyterian Church steeple at 832 32nd Ave. A mock up of the Cingular antenna has been placed on the roof of Madrona Plaza—it looks like a small round gray chimney. A group of neighbors has met with Voicestream and hope to improve the appearance of the proposed church steeple

antennas. If you have questions about the Cingular antenna on Madrona Plaza contact Joan Melendez at 219-1400. If you have comments regarding the proposed church antenna, contact Marty Liebowitz or Pastor Christine Dickerson at 325-0522 or 328-2704, respectively.

Also at the June meeting, the MCC reversed an earlier decision and agreed that, unfortunately, the trees on the west side of 33rd Avenue in front of Madrona School must be replaced. The trees are too tall and past and future pruning and topping threaten their

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Presbyterian Steeple Chase

Voicestream Wireless and Madrona Presbyterian Church are currently investigating the possibility of installing cellular transmission antennas on the church steeple. No agreement has yet been signed and Madrona Presbyterian pastor, Rev. Christine Dickerson, emphasizes that the deal will not go through unless her concerns and those of the community are addressed.

Initial plans called for the installation of eight 6'x1'x4" 40-lb "panel" antennas that would be concealed by flat, fiberglass screens. Lease payments from Voicestream would enable the church to make some much-needed building repairs. If key issues can be resolved, this arrangement could be a great "win-win" for the church and Voicestream cellular phone users in the neighborhood.

Voicestream has hosted two community meetings, the first in Fremont and the second on June 6th at the church. Attendees included several Voicestream representatives and technicians, Rev. Dickerson, and concerned Madrona neighbors and church parishioners. Three major issues were raised: community notification, health concerns, and the installation design.

Required community notification has not yet been completed and eventually information should be available at www.cityofseattle.net/dclu/permitdesk/. Voicestream submitted an installation application on May 24 and it is currently under review by the DCLU. Because the church is in a single-family zone, the project (DCLU # 2201422) requires review under Seattle's SEPA Ordinance and City Council Conditional Use approval. How worried the neighborhood should be about health concerns depends on where you stand (and live!) and how much you trust the industry and its government regulators. To speak with Voicestream's Andrew Thatcher, a specialist in environmental health physics, call him at (253) 627-0139. The final design is an ongoing issue and Voicestream has reduced the number of antennas from eight to three and agreed to work with neighbors to find a design that makes the antennas "invisible" from the street. Excavation for the underground garage is almost complete. July and August will be taken up with concrete and utility work. September and October framing and roofing will occur, with building completion set for May or June 2003. For those interested, pre-leasing of the residential spaces will start in December or January.

There has been great interest in the commercial spaces. The developers feel that businesses that will succeed at this location are those with an established reputation. Madrona Woods: A Chance to Learn and Teach


Many St. Therese 6th graders and Epiphany 5th graders come to Madrona Woods for environmental education throughout the school year, offering the adults who work with them a chance to:

- learn in a very hands-on way about the flora, fauna and habitats of our urban forest.
- share our joy in the stewardship we provide for the woods.
- get to know young people by working together for nine months.
- use our creativity to engage our young friends in our mutual project.

Those of us who have been using the Madrona Woods for environmental education for the last five years have come up with a program that seems to be a valuable addition to the Science curriculum of these local schools. It involves learning about native and invasive plants; studying soil, light and drainage conditions; clearing invasives; learning about, ordering and planting native plants; mulching and doing maintenance; and playing games that teach about observing and understanding the plants, animals and peoples who have lived in the woods for centuries. The children come nearly every other week during the school year to work their assigned plots. Adult volunteers work with the same small groups throughout the year.

This year's students have finished their work and our program will be starting up again in September. Would you like to share in the joys and challenges of this part of the Madrona Woods restoration effort? We are looking for people who can volunteer regularly on Wednesdays—St. Therese comes from 9:00-10:00 and Epiphany from 1:30-2:45 p.m. If you would like to join our environmental education team, please contact Judith Starbuck at 322-2640 or judithstarbuck@msn.com.
