## Notes from Our President by John Capps

☞ We are honored to have new Police Chief Norm Stamper attending our next program meeting on April 5 at 7:30pm at the Shelter House (see article). Please plan to attend. It should be a very interesting and informative evening. Please note the dates of our regular Board and Program Meetings have been exchanged.

☞ It is with great pleasure and enthusiasm that I can report to you that the U.S. Cycling Championship Road Race will be held in Seattle on June 19, 1994. The cyclist will follow a course, passing through Madrona eighteen times.

☞ From April 16-May 1, the Seattle Solid Waste Utility is sponsoring "Spring Clean '94", an annual event when volunteers all over Seattle organize to clean up public spaces, such as sidewalks, roadways, parks and planting strips. Call 233-7187 to register and organize a cleanup around your block.

☞ The Viretta Park Advisory Committee held its last meeting March 2 and recommended the following alternatives to Holly Miller, Superintendent of Parks and Recreation:

1) *Eliminate the driveway from the Park and restore original pedestrian path, make the park whole again. Access to the Schultz's shall be on their own property; or*

2) *Minimize the driveway footprint on Viretta Park, either move the drive further to the west and south so as to minimize impact on the park. The access shall be screened from public and the park and shall have no public usage; or*

3) *Restore the location of the driveway to its original configuration as a path. All security lights, devices or any other property or devices belonging to the Schultz's shall be removed.*

These three alternatives are not the complete recommendation in its entirety but basically describe the position of the Madrona Community Council. A copy of the full recommendation is at the Madrona Public Library. A well-done to Shirley Solomon, Barbara Stenson, Lynn Iglitzen and Marty Liebowitz. The recommendations will be reviewed at a public meeting of the Board of Parks Commissioners on March 24th at the Park Boardroom, 100 Dexter Avenue North at 7:00pm. The public is invited to attend and speak.

☞ We had an excellent presentation at our last program meeting on **Earthquake Preparedness** (see article). The City plans more neighborhood presentations in the Fall. I encourage everyone to take advantage of the next opportunity. We'll all rest a lot easier if we take the easy steps to be prepared.

☞ Thank you to Peggy Monroe, Madrona resident, who has provided us with information about a series of upcoming **Seminars on AIDS Caregiving** (see article). I know that many of us have neighbors, friends and family affected by HIV/AIDS. ## 1994 U.S. Cycling Championships To Visit Madrona

Sports International, in conjunction with the Sports and Events Council of Seattle/King County, has been awarded the 1994 U.S. Cycling Championship. The National Road Race will take place on June 19th between Downtown and Lake Washington. Microsoft has agreed to be the title sponsor of this event, now officially named the Microsoft Grand Prix.

The 8.4 mile race course starts in Downtown Seattle, goes up Yesler to Frink Park, follows Lake Washington Boulevard to Madrona Drive, continues up to the Madrona Business District on 34th, heads west on Union to Martin Luther King Jr. Way, turns south to Yesler, and then returns back downtown. There will be partial and complete road closures from 6 am to 6 pm on Saturday, June 19th. The women's race will be approximately six laps covering 100 km (62 miles) between 8:30 am to 11:30 am. The men's race will be approximately twelve laps covering 160 km (100 miles) between 12:30 pm to 4:30 pm. More than 300 of the Nation's top cyclists are expected to compete.

Madrona Community Council is pleased to have the opportunity for Madrona and Seattle to be showcased locally and nationally. The race will be televised nationally on ESPN. Neighborhood volunteers are being sought to coordinate with the race organizers leading up to the race and on the day of the race. We want to ensure that the disruption of transportation, especially transit, is minimized. ## Earthquake Preparedness

The Madrona Community hosted a very enlightening presentation by LuAnn Johnson, from the City of Seattle Office of Emergency Preparedness, about how to be prepared when the big one comes. She emphasized the benefit of feeling confident that your home and family will be safe. Below we have produced for you and your family one of the important earthquake preparedness tools. LuAnn emphasized the importance of establishing an out-of-area contact where all your family can call in case of a major emergency. Since local telephone service is often disrupted in an emergency, but long distance service is maintained as a priority, it is often easier to call across the country than across town. She also recommended taping a quarter to the back of the Emergency Contact Card because pay phones are one of the emergency networks that will be given priority for communication needs.



## **Confronting Neighborhood Violence**

Statistics show that interpersonal violence, especially among young people, is on the increase. In Washington State, since 1984, the number of aggravated assaults has increased by 63%, murders by 29%, and rapes by 70%.

These statistics are dismal and frightening but, as the stories in this newsletter show, there is hope. Throughout Seattle, neighborhoods are taking direct action to reduce violence. The Garfield Community Council holds nighttime vigils on corners where drug dealers normally do business. In Highpoint, A Call To Action is organizing to deal with some of the underlying causes of violence. Anti-crime councils throughout Seattle are bringing neighborhoods, police, and the criminal justice system together to solve specific crime problems. The Mount Baker Community Club, in addition to organizing block watches, is lobbying for immediate and increased hand gun control. The Brighton-Dunlap Community Council is working with Metro to ensure that bus stops and shelters are clean and safe for senior citizens to use.

Violence touches all of Seattle's neighborhoods without exception. Many neighborhood groups are working to help stop the violence. A community's particular issues set its crime prevention agenda although, currently, youth seems to be on everyone's agenda.

In the same way that violence touches us all, so too every effort to alleviate violence benefits all neighborhoods. Here is one profile of how neighbors are organizing to support youth and to confront violence.

### **VIGILS by the Central Area Neighbors Against Drugs**

Fay Christian is a boardmember of the Garfield Community Council and one of the co-founders of Central Area Neighbors Against Drugs, a group that has organized neighbors to participate in protest marches and vigils. With at least six marchers and at times as many as 50, the group walks along the five or six blocks with the heaviest drug traffic. They carry placards and chant as they walk. "Up with hope! Down with dope!" "Drug dealer, drug dealer, you can't hide: We charge you with genocide!" "You have the right to fight for your neighborhood!" When the group reaches a targeted intersection such as 26th and Cherry, the marchers hold a vigil. For two to four hours, group members occupy all four corners of the intersection. They hold their signs and chant but mainly they simply occupy the space that drug dealers would otherwise be using. They have found that not only are the dealers forced to relocate, but would-be buyers are forced to look harder.

When Central Area Neighbors Against Drugs began, Fay Christian and Chris Evers would schedule three evenings each week with a set time. That way everyone knew when a march and vigil would be held. Unfortunately, the dealers were among those who knew and changed their schedules to miss the marchers. When the group realized what was happening, they scheduled the marches irregularly, getting out the word via a phone tree the night before.

Participants — the majority of whom have been and continue to be women — brought along their children and grandchildren. They were joined by other neighbors who learned of the group by word of mouth and by neighbors who would come out of their houses to join them as they saw them march by. Friends and relatives who joined them took the idea back to their own neighborhoods.

### **Block by Block, Person by Person**

Involvement at the neighborhood level is essential, say activists. Mary Gutierrez has used Mt. Baker's newsletter to promote dozens of block watches that have been formed all over the community on the principle that we must reclaim our streets "one block at a time." She put it this way: "You can't just sit back and say, 'We pay our taxes, why aren't our streets safe?' There just aren't enough tax dollars to enable the police to do it by themselves. I think that people are learning that it's up to every person on the block. The police are there but they can't be everywhere at once. It's up to every one of us."

## Seattle's Comprehensive Plan

The Mayor has released his Recommended Comprehensive Plan. City Council plan to adopt it on June 27, 1994. An evening workshop has been scheduled for March 21 at Center Park, 2121 26th Avenue South (corner of MLK Jr Way S & S Walker) followed by a Public Hearing a week later at the same location. A follow-up city-wide workshop will be held on April 2 from 11:00am-5:00pm at Seattle Center, Snoqualmie Room.

Madrona is designated in the Plan as a Neighborhood Anchor, with the goal to better use its existing commercial area as a neighborhood service and transit focus. Call the Planning Department Hotline (386-9040) for more information

The Committee has received many telephone calls from residents expressing their support for the draft Madrona Transportation Plan published in the last newsletter. Also, during the February 22nd Community Council meeting those present expressed their appreciation to the members of the Committee for their great effort on this project. Only one adverse comment has been received. This was from a resident in the 300 hundred block of Lake Washington Boulevard who was concerned that our Plan "might" increase the traffic on her street. I explained no Projects have been suggested for this street and she was more than welcome to come to our meetings.

On February 10th, the draft Plan was discussed with the Seattle Engineering Department and they were very receptive to developing solutions to the problems that have been identified. The proposed solutions that we had identified during our community meetings were discussed and they agreed to have these reviewed by the Engineering Department staff (Yes, Floyd, I did mention your excellent suggestion about moving the bus stop at 34th & Pike from the north side of the intersection to the south side). They promised to get back to us by early March with their recommendations on solutions to the identified problems and help us to get the changes implemented.

We plan to meet with Seattle Engineering at the Municipal Building as soon as they develop their recommendations. If you are interested in attending this meeting, please give me a call at 323-3450 and I will let you know as soon as the meeting is scheduled. We will schedule a subsequent full Committee or Community meeting to discuss the results and if necessary have representatives from the Engineering Department attend.

### Crime Prevention Support - *excerpts of an article*

The Seattle Neighborhood Group (SNG) was formed in 1988 to provide staff and administrative support and structure for community crime prevention councils. We work directly with crime prevention councils, such as the East Precinct Crime Prevention Council. Our expertise is in providing: a) Information about the criminal justice system; b) Up-to-date information about criminal justice legislation at the State level; c) Tracking of public safety issues in City and County government; d) Start-up community organizing around public safety problems.

In 1992 we began providing support services to the Stop the Violence committee which successfully removed almost 1,800 guns from the streets of Seattle in September 1992 and provided 5,000 coupons for gun locks to promote safe storage of handguns in September 1993.

In 1994 we will begin to work with neighborhoods experiencing the problems associated with nuisance properties by providing information to facilitate small claims court action. Please call (728-0903) for more information.

## AIDS Caregivers Support Network

ACSN is a non-profit organization dedicated to assisting AIDS Caregivers with emotional and practical support through group services, individual support, and written materials.

Services offered by ACSN include an information line, monthly seminars, a careteam booklet, a "Quick Guide" (help with accessing services and support for a loved one with AIDS), and group education/training programs. They also publish a quarterly newsletter written by and for AIDS Caregivers.

Peggy Monroe, Madrona resident since 1968, has been involved in hands-on AIDS Caregiving for the past 6 years. She began attending ACSN seminars in the spring of 1991, became a regular Caregiver columnist for the ACSN Quarterly, and wrote a book (published July 1993) called *Circles of Care: Creating and Maintaining a Careteam for Persons with HIV/AIDS*, which is available at the Madrona Library. She presently is on the Board of Directors of ACSN and is assisting with the preparation and presentation of the seminars described below. 
