Monthly Neighborhood Update

This month the Madrona Community Council (MCC) welcomed guest-speaker King Co. Councilman Larry Gossett. He shared many tidbits about what's happening in and around us in the 10th District, including the 25¢ peak-fare bus increase. Funds raised will be used to improve services in south and east King County.

The Seattle Council on Airport Noise (SCAA) is calling for a moratorium on Sea-Tac expansion until the Port of Seattle develops a workable plan to control current noise problems. In my opinion, the political leadership at the local, state and federal levels lack the resolve to address the issues. The FAA is in the hip pocket of the airlines and will do little to solve the problems. Talk about the fox guarding the hen house! One solution would be to disband the FAA;

certain functions, such as air traffic control, should be privatized. Aircraft noise control responsibility should be strengthened and transferred to EPA. Only then will we have a real chance to reduce aircraft noise. Call SCAA at 763-722 or visit www.airportnoise.org for additional information.

- A new grand park entrance at 34th and Spring with a stroller and ADA ramp
- French doors and other improvements to the Shelterhouse to make it more welcoming, including a native plant Peace Garden
- Continuation of the patio surfaced with community bricks (yes, they are still for sale!)
- Resurfacing of the tennis courts

Construction of this Phase is planned to begin April 2002. This year we are committed to raising the money to build these improvements. 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I Remember When...

Taking Care of Business in Madrona since 1980 *Thanks to Monad*

For 21 years, clay sculpture artist, health food store owner, vegan cook, and general contractor, Monad, as been keeping a watchful eye on the changing face and faces of downtown Madrona. Everyone who strolls by his Pure Manifestations restaurant can't help but notice his colorful, playful creations. And while the pedestrians of Madrona look in at him and his world, Monad looks out at them and theirs.

When he first came to Madrona, he ran three businesses, a health food store, an office, and a clay studio in the space now occupied by Supreme. In those days his next-door neighbors were Deano the Clown to the north and Wilkens Jewelers on the corner where Café Soliel is today. Behind Wilkens, in what became Loudeye, was Black Arts Northwest, another music-related business. Across the street was the IGA Market.

Although his shops have changed focus and locations over the past twenty years, Monad has never been without a business in Madrona. When he could easily have moved on, perhaps relocating to Leschi where he now lives, he continues to be a central part of Madrona because the neighborhood calls to him. His heart keeps him here and being an entrepreneur suits him because it allows him a freedom few of us can match.

The space he occupies now used to house two businesses, his and a piano studio. In those days Monad lived upstairs and looked across the street at the Madrona Drug Store on the corner and a t-shirt shop a few doors down where the art gallery is now. In between was a beauty shop, just as there is today, although the owners are not the same. Then, as now, the shopkeepers in Madrona were a mix of ethnicities, Black, White, and Asian. When he arrived, the neighborhood was finished with its racial issues. Instead, all people were hospitable to each other, and relations across color lines were warm.

His vegan restaurant now keeps short hours because he is too busy working other projects. His passion is teaching children and introducing them to the power of art. Over the past 15 years, Monad has taught over 5,000 students throughout the state the secrets of clay whistle making and is currently writing a book on this nearly lost art. In recent months he spent time as an artist in residence at schools in Bellingham. Closer to home, he works with elementary schools throughout Seattle, teaching clay sculpture, soft sculpture, papier mache, bronze casting, and helping on special projects. He recently completed a wetland tile project at Dearborn Park elementary. He has been an artist in residence at St. Therese several times but, interestingly, has never been invited to help out at Madrona School, right in his own back yard.

While Madrona continues to change, Monad, his dreadlocks tucked into his tall batik hat, remains a constant and it's hard to imagine the neighborhood without him. Like the trees, he is part of the life-blood of Madrona. Like the stars, he is a jewel for all to enjoy.
