Letter from Our President

I would like to thank the Madrona Community, Rogers Thriftway and the entire Madrona Business District and all the volunteers for their strong support for the First Annual Madrona Holiday Arts Festival., and an extra special thank you to Terry Spaccarotelli for a great job organizing the event. We raised over \$1500 for the Madrona Community Council.

The Madrona Community has received a Sex Offender Information Bulletin. Detective R.A. Shilling presented an updated status of the bulletin at the November 2nd Board Meeting. The man involved is not currently residing in Madrona, but may be visiting frequently. For more information see the copies of the bulletin at the Sally Goldmark Library. Detective Shilling presented some helpful safety tips including: Be aware of what is going on around you at all times; Practice knowing where the people are around you and what kind of activity they are involved in; Children should not be involved in helping adults in cars or "going around the corner to look at kittens"; All children should know their first and last names; You and your child should have a code name that only you and your child know; Be aware at bus stops and corners; Get your Block Watch active and help watch out for you neighbors. The community council and neighbors of Viretta Park have been following the discussion of how to resolve the community's concern about the impact of the drive way access through its upper portion. Following the community meeting in October, the Parks Department met with the adjoining property owner who is doing the work and responded to the community with a list of changes including location of the signage, completion of the path, usage of native plants, improving views, leaving an area open for play, replacing and adding benches, and screening the concrete wall. The issue even rated a recent TV story which led off with a picture of the Great Wall of China. Some of the more immediate neighbors continue to be concerned. The community council has asked for another meeting before the City signs any agreement with the adjoining property owner.

On a celebratory note, we hope to put together the Second Annual Holiday Concert in partnership with St. Therese between Christmas and New Years. Details are still being worked out, but watch for a future announcement and plan to join us for another exciting evening of holiday music.



Public Safety in Madrona
How You Can Help Make a Safer Neighborhood



Everyone agrees that crime is on the rise. Politicians rise and fall across the country on this issue. We all know people or have ourselves been the victim of this crime. What can you do? What can we do? Lots of things. The Madrona Community Council's Public Safety committee is attempting to help inform and organize Madrona residents so that we may feel safer in our neighborhood. You can get involved!

One way to feel safer is to understand what is happening in our community. The Committee plans to use this column and other means to educate the Madrona neighborhood on things we can do to help out. There are many resources available to us to help prevent crime before it happens. There are block watch programs, the community police team, the Narcotics and Vice department, the Checks and Forgery Unit and numbers you can call at the East Precinct to prevent problems before they happen. Following is a list of some of the important resources you should know about.

mike wilson

Police Department 625-5011
 To report information that is suspicious in nature but a non-emergency.
One of the biggest mistakes people make is not calling the police. If you notice suspicious behavior of any type. REPORT IT!! The police are experienced at prioritizing what is and what is not worthy of further investigation. Let them do their job! If you don't report it, the police won't know about it! Examples of suspicious behavior include "tapping" cars, trespassing, snooping and loitering.

Police Department East Precinct Watch Commander 684-4300
 To report a chronic, on-going problem that has not been resolved by calling 911.
If you have procedural or administrative questions, a Thank you for the police department or comments on a behavior of an individual police officer.

Community Police Team 684-4370
The community police team has helped many residents of the Madrona neighborhood resolve their problems peacefully and quickly. Their commitment to the neighborhood and knowledge of the ins and outs of city government make them an invaluable resource.

Crime Prevention 684-7555
 For information on starting a Block Watch program, residential security, neighborhood crime and public safety concerns and free home security surveys.
Sonja Richter and other members of the Crime Prevention unit have helped start many local block watch programs. With a little bit of effort you and your immediate neighbors can help protect each other from crime.

Community Service Officers 684-4790
If you have a Landlord/Tenant dispute, non-violent neighborly dispute, require emergency services such as food, shelter or clothing, want to report juvenile runaways, missing and found persons or lost children.

Narcotics/Vice 684-5797 (8am-4pm) 684-8660 (9am-midnight)
 To report on-going suspected drug activity and on-going suspected gambling and prostitution.

Parking Enforcement 684-8763
 To report abandoned vehicles or on-going parking violations and problems.
Abandoned cars are a symbol of a block that is prime for criminal activity. Show criminals that you are conscious of what is happening around you. Report abandoned cars!

Harbor Patrol 684-4071
 Any emergency or crime on ship canals or waterways.

Dept of Construction & Land Use 684-7899
 To report structures that pose a danger to public safety, illegal littering, storage or parking on private property.
Zoning laws and land use laws protect our neighborhood from decay. The Department of Construction and Land Use can help protect Madrona's uniqueness.

 To order commercial and residential flood light rental and to report needed street light repair.

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Madrona History Group:

Documenting the Activist Sixties

Years after their own children graduated, an ad hoc history advisory group met recently in Madrona School to generate names of people who shaped the direction of education, health, poverty, civil rights, housing, or employment - often many of the above - during the 1960's. Mary Kenny, Deedee Rainbow, Carol Richman, Roger and Dorothy Sale, Margaret Waldo, and Geri Ware could have gone on and on, but with a list of nearly 100 people, we had enough to get started!

Madrona School was the hub of the community life during the 1960's. It was a positive, challenging, bonding period as well as one of contention and confrontation. PTA meetings provided the forum for discussions of larger community issues. Many institutions were being challenged then, and many of the movers and shakers lived in Madrona. Respect and friendships forged between neighbors during those campaigns are easily and happily rekindled today, decades later. As Madrona School returns to its community school base, now seems an opportune time to document and honor the importance of activism in school and community life.

Early next year history gathering sessions will invite everyone's participation in reconstructing what happened during the '60's, why and with what consequences. In addition, neighbors will interview key activists about their perspectives. Finally all the materials and key people will be featured at a public reception in the spring.

We need volunteers for all parts of this project. Mature students and adults will conduct one-hour interviews of selected activists and write-up brief notes of their interviews. It should take no more than 4 hours per interviewee to complete this work. Additional preparations and materials will be provided and the work may be completed before March 15th. **Please call Kay Gordon (328-1327) if you are interested in talking with people who represent the best of Madrona's activist heritage.**

Madrona residents have had a year and a half to discover Sky Visions, the brainchild of Vickie Vellinga. It is a frame shop and more. After 15 years of picture framing, including 9 years as manager of framing at Stonington Gallery downtown, Vickie was ready for a place of her own. Mirroring her own interests as an artist and woodworker, the shop serves as a gallery of artwork and wood creations done by herself and other artists as well as a full scale framing operation.

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**Madrona Community Council Committee Reports
Community Relations Committee**

We discussed the questionnaire for neighborhood input on business district growth. The conclusion is to have a few questions stated carefully and positively with other committee questions on an insert page in the Madrona News that is easy to respond to and return. This is tentatively planned for the January newsletter.

A new Madrona business list is being prepared for the January newsletter. Any business who wants to be on it should contact Vickie Vellinga at Sky Visions, 328-4246.

We spoke of the Holiday open house at the 34th and Union business district. We have plans for decorations and any suggestions are still welcome. We will try to involve more businesses.

We looked at a topographical map of Madrona with zoning information. The business planning committee is interested in zoning two full blocks on 34th from park to park for business use. And they hope to direct the growth in a positive way for the community.

We talked of the advantages and disadvantages of growth. Parking is the issue that causes the most concern. Safety is another issue. A positive result of growth may be more walking traffic, more activity leading to more successful businesses and a feeling safety with more people around.

Traffic/Transportation Committee

During our last meeting on October 26th several traffic concerns were raised regarding speeding cars on our streets as short cuts to avoid the arterials. Concerns were also raised about the lack of parking by the businesses on 34th, because of the other residents using it for park and ride parking. The problem is only expected to get worse when the apartment/business complex at 34th and Pike is completed. Also, objections were raised about the #3 bus taking up parking on 34th and using 33rd as a turn around street because of the unsafe traffic congestion by the school.

Suggested solutions for these problems included mid-street planting islands on E. Denny Way, additional traffic circles and removal of the yield signs on 32nd, two hour parking on 34th, having businesses pay Group Health for the use of their parking lot, making 33rd a one-way street and having the #3 bus use the same turn around as the #2 bus.

We are also participating with other Central Area community councils in discussing with Engineering the impact of their signalization project on Martin Luther King Jr. Way.

Your input on these and other transportation issues/problems and possible solutions is needed. So plan to attend the next Traffic/Transportation Committee (call Bill Hanson 323-3450). In future meetings we plan to discuss traffic problems with the Seattle Engineering Department to obtain their ideas on possible solutions. We will then develop a transportation plan for the community that will contain our plan for resolving these issues and work to obtain City funding for identified projects.

Madrona Gardeners

Successful gardeners disagreed about the efficacy of mulching, but for those willing to try for themselves, neighborhood experts Sally Alhadeff and Sue Clark offered suggestions for what (leaves, hay, manure, compost, and more, where (produce, perennials, natives), when (rarely to continuous), and how much (up to 6 inches!) to use. Ann Lennartz also presented her approach to hillside gardening - a problem many of us share - using native plants: mahonia, evergreen huckleberries, salal, bunchberry, and Twin Flower. Contributed perennials and starts were available for the taking.



At the December 1st meeting (see calendar) we'll create holiday decorations using plants from our winter gardens. Novice to professional gardeners are welcome to join in this fun workshop. Participants should bring a bag with greens and other dried plant and decorative materials. Call Barbara McKeon (329-5051) for more information.

For the January 5th meeting each person is asked to present three favorite gardening books and magazines. They may be plant references, planning/idea sources, essays, whatever.
