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

Meeting Summaries by Doug Tooley

September 3, 1996

Secretary's Report:
Minutes confirmed and adopted.

Treasurer's Report:
Annual Totals (9/1/95-8/31/96): Income-\$8,907.50: Expenses-\$9,009.11;
Balance in account-\$1,439.72.

Board Election
Mary Palmer, Nancy Pew's replacement at the Sally Goldmark library, will fill the Library Chair position. The slate for the 1996-97 MCC Board, as submitted and amended, was approved by acclamation with no dissents, no abstentions.

Madrona Elementary
Hal Kimball, Principal at Madrona Elementary, introduced himself to us in his new capacity. Hal had formerly served as Vice Principal. He expressed interest in what we are doing and his hopes to continue to work with us in the future. Hal then introduced Ed Brown the new Vice Principal. Ed has been in education for 21 years and with the school district for the past 11 years. He served 5 years as principal at View Ridge.

Madrona Woods Project
Mary Holm (329-9739) reported that they had hired a consultant for a needs assessment in the area. The consultant is Becca Hanson of the Portico Group.

Shirley Solomon, Former President
Shirley informed us she and Curt Miller are moving from Madrona to Fir Island and that she would pass along funded project information to Bill and Jerry. A plaque was presented and special thanks were expressed from the Community Council for all the service over many years to the neighborhood by Shirley and Curt.

Madrona Library
John Sheets, Branch Library Manager at Douglas Truth (Parent Library for Sally Goldmark) came to speak to us about Nancy Pew's replacement, and while here to introduce himself to us and briefly discuss library programs and directions. Mary Palmer, the replacement librarian was introduced. Mary is most recently from the Columbia City Branch (where Nancy is now working). Nancy Pew was thanked for her fine service.

The movement of the SPLASH program to Madrona School was mentioned, and it was hoped that the Library would now be more accessible for adult use in the late afternoon.

Neighborhood Service Center
Ted Divina, Central Area Neighborhood Service Center, came to update us on his activities. The Service Center provides a number of services including utility billing, legal and tax clinics, and information about other city services. Concerns about the Neighborhood Cleanup were raised and Ted said he would look into it.

Outreach Grant
Michael Kern described his outreach project and his effort to fund a brochure. To date funds have not yet been obtained.

Newsletter
Martin Sellars will undertake a review of the mailing list. Some concerns were raised about hand delivering newsletters to the bottom of steps. Several other people called to say that this was the first time they'd ever received one. Jerry Arbes submitted a break down of various newsletter costs.

C.H.A.R.E.
Community Health Advocacy and Resource Education, Tarek Salaway and Kimberlee (296-4876) A presentation was made regarding a Central Area health improvement program sponsored by the King County Department of Public Health. They seek "community partners", resident volunteers, to help develop programs including expanding jobs development in Public Health for community members as well as general economic development tasks.

Madrona Elementary
Susan Stocking and Marge Anderson reported about many changes occurring at the school as the APP program prepares to leave. A request was made to place an insert in the newsletter and the request was accepted unanimously. A community meeting is being planned with a date to be set soon. A survey will be included as a part of the effort. This is a part of the effort to develop the new school assignment/cluster plan and an eye is being kept on the developing criteria for school assignment priority as well as the upcoming physical renovation.

Madrona Music in the Streets
While those who attended had a great time, the fundraising event lost money due in part to low attendance. A lengthy discussion was held about the funding of the event. Michael Kern suggested funding limits as a matter of policy and Jill Gordon suggested we do a better job of developing budgets. John Capps suggested we involve the entire business district next time. All ideas were well received.

Rummage Sale
Rummage sale grossed nearly \$500, half from donations, half from vendors. Doug thanked John Capps and Terri Spacaretelli for lending their expert event experience. Michael Kern suggested doing two a year and 'mashing' the music festival and the rummage sale together, with say the music starting at 12p

Planning and Land Use:
A big event is scheduled for October 22nd regarding our neighborhood planning. County Councilmember Larry Gossett will be the keynote speaker. Call Maid Adams for more info: 323-3058. Michael Kern reported that the outreach grant has verbal approval and he submitted a draft brochure for the Community Council.

Madrona Rummage Sale by Doug Tooley

The Madrona Rummage Sale was a great success. As a fundraiser for the Madrona Community Council, the Sale was held on Saturday, September 7 in the Group Health Parking lot under threatening skies with 25 different vendors, and we grossed nearly \$500. One estimate put the total attendance somewhere between 100 and 500 folks. About half the profits came from the sale of donated goods, and about half from the vendor fee of \$10 each.

Terri Spacoratelli and John Capps were great advisers with their extensive event experience here in Madrona. 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Share Your Thoughts on the Future of Madrona School

The Seattle School District is in the process of proposing significant changes in student assignment and program placement. Relocation of the APP (Accelerated Pupil Progress) program currently located at Madrona Elementary) has been identified as a high priority. When APP is relocated about 375 students will leave and Madrona School will have significant capacity for program growth.

This is our opportunity as a community to influence the program at Madrona. The District has proposed that Madrona could be a kindergarten through eighth grade school available to all students in the Central Area (roughly the area from I-90 to the Ship Canal from downtown to Lake Washington). It could be based on the TOPS model (a Capitol Hill alternative K-8 school). To facilitate the transition, the District has made Karen Kodama, the TOPS principal, available to Madrona as a consultant.

Ms. Kodama has been meeting with focus groups of teachers, administrators, parents and staff. They have worked to identify strengths and weaknesses of the current program and share hopes and dreams of future programs. We would like to share those with you and invite you to share your ideas with us. The reverse side of this page is a survey which we hope you will take a few minutes to fill out and return by **October 18**. After surveys have been collected and collated, we will host open neighborhood planning meetings. At that time an ongoing working board will be established to prepare a proposal for the District and prepare to market Madrona to prospective parents in the spring.

Positive aspects of the school include:

- * Admired teachers and staff are willing to implement new ideas and methods to accommodate all learning styles
- * Students are given opportunity to share with other classes and the community at large
- * Madrona staff guide with encouragement and praise
- * Great art and music programs

Ideas for program focus:

- * Emphasis on foreign language
- * Emphasis on math/science
- * Emphasis on computers with full curriculum integration
- * Develop a unique Focus

Other ideas include:

- * Extended day for arts, sports and tutoring
- * Multi age grouping for instruction
- * Reduced class size

Pros and cons of Kindergarten through Eighth Configuration

Pros:

1. Nine years to work with students
2. Less change in turbulent middle school years
3. Cross age groupings
4. Curriculum sequencing/consistency.
5. Support of subject matter specialists - curriculum focus.
6. Middle School - small setting, fewer students falling through the cracks academically and behaviorally.
7. Family commitment to the school.

Cons: (Refers to middle school only)

1. Middle School - can't offer lots of variety in subjects (electives: art, foreign language, music).
2. Small number - sometimes difficult for students to find a peer group (less variety and diversity).
3. Students get tired of each other.
4. If student/teacher not a good match - fewer alternatives.
5. Support services limited.
6. Middle school behavior can have a negative effect on elementary students.
